Newsworthy: interesting enough to the general public to warrant reporting (Merriam Webster)



General Public

- Who is going to be interested in your news release?
- Think about target audiences.
- Do you and the news outlet share a common audience target?
- WHY would the news outlet want to share your information with their audience?

Things that are new -- if it happened today, it's news. If it happened last week, it's "olds."

Significance

Based on the number of people affected by the story.

Proximity

How close is/did this happen to their readers?

Representation Prominence

Famous people get more coverage.

Human Interest

Human interest stories appeal to emotion, and don't always have to meet the other criteria.

- **Who does this affect?**
- What audience am I trying to reach?
- Does my audience match the news outlet's?
- Is there anyone famous (and at what level are they famous) involved?
- Are there any timeless aspects to this story, or can it be used as a human interest piece?

Press Release

A press release is a statement prepared for distribution to news media announcing something *newsworthy* with the intent of gaining media coverage.


